**Celebration at Highlandtown Today—
Wuddle About School Teachers.**

The celebration this afternoon at Highlandtown of the introduction of steam fire engines there and at Canton will be participated in by the county fire department and the veteran firemen of Baltimore. In the parade will also be a large number of horsemen, several floats and three bands of music. A barbecue will be held afterward at Wiesner's Park, Highlandtown, followed by addresses from Messrs. Charles E. Fendall, John Grason and others. The new engines for Highlandtown and Canton have arrived.

The new trustees appointed Mr. Price as the successor of Mr. Shauer, but it is said they failed to give Mr. Shauer the required thirty days' notice. Mr. Shauer refused to give up his position and opened the school Monday.

William H. Todd, J. Melchior Fowble and Abraham C. Scott were appointed by the county commissioners, examiners for the opening of a road to begin at the western end of the road condemned and closed at the time Tufton avenue was opened and extending easterly to Tufton avenue.

The Halethorpe Building and Loan Association of Baltimore County was incorporated by Oregon B. Benson, C. R. Yarley Myera, Henry E. Cook, Ferdinand Deboy, William Ingle, William B. Hopkins and Albert L. Carson. The capital stock is \$100,000.

Licenses have been issued for the marriage of John Greener Bluford, of Baltimore, and Lenore Victoria Turner, of Lutherville, and George H. Willis, of Virginia, and Emma Lochstampfer, of Butler, Baltimore county.

In the Orphans' Court letters of administration were granted to Mary Jane Chilcoat on the estate of Elijah Chilcoat, bond \$2,500; and to Mary E. Schultz on the estate of John F. Schultz, bond \$700.

The commission of Dr. Abram H. Price as a member of the board of supervisors of elections of Baltimore county in the place of Dr. H. J. Hebb, resigned, has been received at the clerk's office.

Mr. Randolph Barton stated that wood is piled on each side of Lake avenue, at the intersection of Roland avenue, making it dangerous to cross the electric railway.

Dr. H. J. Hebb, chairman of the last democratic executive committee of the county, has issued a call for a meeting of the new committee at Towson September 12.

Mrs. Schultz, widow of Mr. John F. Schultz, has been appointed sexton of Trinity Protestant Episcopal Church, Towson, a position formerly held by her husband.

The county commissioners assessed the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company and the American Bell Telephone Company each \$30,000.

The taxes on St. Stanislaus Cemetery, near the tollgate of the new shell road, were abated for 1893.

Reports show 83 arrests at Canton, 13 at Govanstown and 7 at Mt. Washington in August.
